

I went to the arcade the other day. I'm also aware arcades are a false economy — why sink tens of pounds in copper coins in a claw machine when you can buy the longed-for plushie for a fraction of the price on Amazon?

I'm not a gambler but I don't have anything against arcades, really. If we go in the knowledge that we're not going to get rich and don't spend more than we can afford, what's the harm? I went because I'm listening to an audiobook called *The Artist's Way* which seeks to unlock people's inner creativity by encouraging them to do two things repeatedly: first, morning pages – three pages of longhand, stream-of-consciousness writing every morning, and second, artist's dates, an hour a week where you go on a date with yourself, or rather, as Julia Cameron puts it, with 'your inner creative child'. I appreciate it sounds hokey but the part of us that longs to create, to

make art, is vulnerable to criticism and therefore in need of nurture, like a child. So, off to the arcade I went.

Finally, after ten minutes or so I wondered, 'I'm a Christian, if I ask God to bless this coin, will it cause lots of money to come tinkling out?' I said a prayer, popped the coin in the machine, and, predictably, nothing. I shrugged then carried on until my little plastic money tub was empty. I was down a pound, but I was up a revelation. Of course God didn't act on my prayer, if he did all Christians would be gambling addicts.

Here's what I wrote in yesterday's morning pages, 'I suppose that's why not all prayers are answered as we expect if at all. It's hope that sustains us, not instant gratification. If miracles happened all the time, making church one massive miracle machine, it would attract billions, but for all the wrong reasons. It's like spending time with your grandparents because you love them and you want to, not because if you spend an hour or so with them every now and then, they might give you £20.'

When I was a child, I prayed to God over and over, 'I want to be a writer!' And here I am, writing. It's my fault for not being more specific. I told him I wanted to be a storyteller and he called me to be a priest. Thanks be to God that on July 4th, Independence Day, that call was affirmed by Bishop Stephen who has recommended me to train for ordination at Ripon College Cuddesdon beginning this September. They say if you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans. Thank you, Holy Trinity, for your trust and God bless.

Holy Trinity and our Choral Tradition

A Year in the life of Holy Trinity Church - Weymouth 1903

The year 1903 began with a Parish Tea on 7th January, where Price Stedman sang to entertain the parishioners. In February it was announced that the new organ would be ready for Easter to great excitement. An oak case designed by the Diocesan Architect was to cost £271. As you will have noticed, the cost of the organ goes up and up! In April the receipts for the fund had raised to £540 and a concert in aid of the organ, at Connaught House arranged by 'Mrs Morgan' brought in another £10.

During the last 10 days of April 1903, Messrs Walker and Sons began bringing in loads of pipes, and piles of wood. Only the Great Organ and Swell Organ were to be completed. The choir was scheduled to be added later when further sums came in.



The organ did not quite arrive in time for Easter but on Thursday 28th May celebrations of the 'New Instrument' started with Holy

Communion at 8 am and a short Choral Mattins at 11.30 am when the new organ was dedicated. The old organ was used to accompany the music up to the hymn after the 3rd Collect. This hymn was specially written for the dedication of an organ by Dr N A Bonavia Hunt (a well known writer on, and expert in organ tonal schemes. This was followed by Stainer's Te Deum in B Flat played by Mr Thorne on the 'New Instrument'

In the afternoon an organ recital was held and a Festal Evensong followed at 7.30 pm. Sir W G Alcock (organist at the Chapels Royal and Permanent Assistant at Westminster Abbey) gave two recitals, one at 3.30 pm and another at 8.45 pm, raising a further £102 for the organ fund.

It was announced that the old organ was to go 'almost at once' to St Paul's.

Mr Thorne celebrated the whole event by giving the choirmen and clergy a luncheon at the Burdon. The choir presented Mr Thorne with a 'secretaire' as a token of their appreciation and esteem for his long service of 27 years (so far!). Tommy Hibbs presented an organ stool in oak made by himself. This stool is still used by Gary to this day.

In August the parish magazine announced the final statement for the organ fund was to be held over, but in October the balance sheet was published showing that total cost of the organ was £1,256-10-6. Receipts totalled £824-9-6. A flurry of events followed to try to make up the shortfall including a Church Workers Festival in October and a

'Conversazione' at Sidney Hall and plans to hold another 'Forest of Trees' in January 1904. This time visitors to the 'Forest of Trees' were promised an appearance from 'Professor Dryasdust and his Egyptian Mummies'

As always the choirboys had a day out at Upwey for tea and a cricket match and the men went on their annual trip to London. I was interested to note that Mr R C Watts had gone on the trip in 'his dual position of Churchwarden and Chorister'.

Transformation

Righteousness is the standard of God's character. Everything He does or does not do is because of His character. His character is defined by the term Righteous. Righteousness in its simplest form means right, upright, straight. God is the only one who is right. Right in the sense of Righteousness, is that God is right about good and evil.

We usually have a one-dimensional view of this: good is pleasant, desirable, healthy, light, life, prosperity, peace, joy. In Hebrew it is more in terms of harmony. Good is in harmony with God. Therefore, righteousness occurs when we harmonise our rightness to God's rightness. Evil is not only something bad, horrible, nasty, corrupt. In Hebrew it is in disharmony with the rightness of God. It is in terms of chaos, entropy, random, darkness. Anything God says is destructive, is damaging to us. We are not in Righteousness if we are experiencing a quality of life that is less than the quality and perfection of God.

Righteousness is a free gift, so do we think that it doesn't matter what we do and can sin? Sin still leads to death, even though we have been forgiven from that sin. Adam and Eve, in the garden, when they sinned were forgiven but they still began to die both physically and spiritually.

The Church, however, rejected Righteousness and introduced Penance. This says you must suffer to receive forgiveness for your sin. If this is true, then this is denying what Jesus did on the cross, leading to, there is no need for Jesus. As Paul says, Righteousness is the stumbling stone of the Gospel.

"I don't necessarily love Righteousness and hate wickedness." I may not think in those terms, but the lure of the temptations I want to give in to, if I don't own that statement, I will never overcome the temptations. I make the decision to believe the Gospel of peace, where I can be honest with God without any fear of admitting anything to Him. I confess and take ownership of my behaviour (1 Jn 1:9). Confession is to say the same thing as the logos says.

No matter what I confess, God still loves me, sin has no power over me, I am committing this sin because I want to, I am not a slave to this sin, the blood of Jesus washes me, Jesus paid my price. God's Righteous justice is that He has already forgiven me and no matter what I struggle with He is always on my side.

If I don't appropriate by faith the blood of Jesus, I will never get rid of the guilt or shame. When we yield to sin, we give power to death. God loves me and it breaks His heart to see me going through this.

Loving Righteousness is to hold it in high regard and value it. But how can I value it when it is keeping me from any pleasure? Pleasure and fulfilment can be found by following the Righteous path, but because I am not on it, then I don't know that pleasure and fulfilment are coming – make sense?

It is my conscience that convicts me to think the compromises I make and the temptations I am giving in to are wrong, not God. If my conscience does not convict me then I have no value for the Righteousness of God and already have a hardened heart. King David said, 'taste and see how good the Lord is' (Ps 34:8). Righteousness is experiential.

When we yield to Righteousness, we experience the power of righteousness and life. In our spirit we are as righteous as we possibly can be, we have no need to become more righteous. The question is, is the Righteousness of Christ permeating and giving life to my thoughts, health, and the people in my life?

How one defines Righteousness determines if one is trying to become righteous or believes they are already righteous. The word righteous is a continuum that begins with what God did in our spirit, all the way through to our behaviour (this is justification, Sanctification, leading to Glorification - not explained here).

Israel did not want to come to God on God's terms, but on Israel's terms based on the sacrifices, keeping their laws, how they prayed. This is based on works. The Gentiles did not have all this culture and tradition. They were unqualified, but God said this is a free gift, so hey, they took it by faith in what He said. They did not seek Righteousness like Israel, but they found it by faith (Romans 9:30-33). One cannot understand Righteousness if one does not come at it from the perspective of Faith Righteousness.

If God gave His Son up for you - the righteous for the unrighteous (1 Pet 3:18) - who will find fault with you, God? (Rom 8:32,33). Is He going to give you the gift of Righteousness and then find fault with you?

Righteousness is how I should be. God gives a template, context, definition of how I should be. This is a gift given by God and if we believe His report (Is 53:1) then Faith Righteousness will not be a stumbling stone.

God protects, guides, leads, but there is such a thing as suffering for Righteousness' sake, where we find ourselves in situations where there is no deliverance. This should make no difference to how we live and what we believe (1 Pet 3:14).


God's truth, justice, mercy is defined in His Righteousness.
Righteousness says you cannot commit the sin and somebody else pay the penalty for it. The person committing the sin has to pay (Ex 34:7). This is why Jesus had to become our sin, because He could not

just take it from us and pay it for us. Him becoming our sin leaves us sin free; therefore, we do not have to pay the penalty because He would have to pay the penalty for the sins He became for us.

St Paul says, 'for with the heart man believeth <u>unto</u> righteousness, and with the mouth is confession made <u>unto</u> salvation' (Ro 10:10). Righteousness has to come alive in your heart, it cannot be experienced intellectually. <u>Unto</u> encompasses all the logos, which becomes our truth when we take hold of it and bring it to ourselves.

Righteousness is doing its thing around my active faith – Jesus is building His Righteousness around me; therefore, I don't have to be or acquire this, it just comes to me and shows in my life.


This is life as it should be the zoe life (Divine life of God).



Saint of the month:

Padre Pio



I first encountered Padre Pio when a priest showed me a relic from his cassock. It meant very little to me at the time. Later I saw a reel of Padre Pio speaking about rhetoric and how the language of unworthiness, making people feel undeserving of God's love, comes from Satan, never from God. In Glastonbury last week I meandered through a pagan bookshop and there on the top of a pile was Padre Pio's Spiritual Direction for Every Day, edited by Gianluigi Pasquale. I've read it every day since. The following is from www.catholiccultutre.org as my Missal predates his sanctification! Keep an eye out for a new film called Padre Pio starring Shia LeBeouf coming this year.

Born to a southern Italian farming family, the son of Grazio, a shepherd. At age 15 he entered the novitiate of the Capuchin Friars

in Morcone and joined the order at age 19. He suffered several health problems, and at one point his family thought he had tuberculosis. He was ordained at age 22 on 10 August 1910.

While praying before a cross on September 20, 1918, Padre Pio received the stigmata. He is the first priest ever to be so blessed. As word spread, especially after American soldiers brought home stories of Padre Pio following WWII, the priest himself became a point of pilgrimage for both the pious and the curious. He would hear confessions by the hour, reportedly able to read the consciences of those who held back. He was reportedly able to bi-locate, levitate, and heal by touch.

In 1956 he founded the House for the Relief of Suffering, a hospital that serves 60,000 a year. Padre Pio died on September 23, 1968 at age 81.

Today there are over 400,000 members worldwide in prayer groups begun by Padre Pio in the 1920s.

His canonization miracle involved the cure of Matteo Pio Colella, age 7, the son of a doctor who works in the House for Relief of Suffering, the hospital in San Giovanni Rotondo. On the night of June 20, 2000, Matteo was admitted to the intensive care unit of the hospital with meningitis. By morning doctors had lost hope for him as nine of the boy's internal organs had ceased to give signs of life. That night, during a prayer vigil attended by Matteo's mother and some Capuchin friars of Padre Pio's monastery, the child's condition improved suddenly. When he awoke from the coma, Matteo said that he had seen an elderly man with a white beard and a long, brown habit, who said to him: "Don't worry, you will soon be cured." The miracle was approved by the Congregation and Pope John Paul II on 20 December 2001. Let us pray.

Almighty ever-living God, who, by a singular grace, gave the Priest Saint Pius a share in the Cross of your Son and, by means of his ministry, renewed the wonders of your mercy, grant that through his intercession we may be united constantly to the sufferings of Christ, and so brought happily to the glory of the resurrection. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

That his life can be renewed


Blows and strikes may knock you over
